FINANCIAL STEWARDSHIP

Strategic Focus

GSSD believes that we are all accountable. Board members, students, staff, families and community members have a responsibility, both individually and as part of the learning team, to participate and to contribute positively to public education.

Long-term Goals

By June 2020, GSSD will implement systemic approaches to find efficiencies and increase value for money allowing the division to respond to the challenges of student and staff needs.

RESTRICTED RESERVES

In March 2017 the Board approved the transfer of funds from unrestricted accumulated surplus and established restricted accumulated surplus funds for the following:

The Facilities and Transportations Departments were asked to prepare a plan on how to appropriately spend these funds. The plan was submitted to the board for approval in February 2018.

In the months following the board meeting these projects were tendered in order to make the most fiscally responsible decisions. To date all projects have come in at or below budget and all projects will be completed by the end of the 2017-18 budget year.

NON-SCHOOL FACILITIES AUDIT

Over the last few years a number of deficiencies and issues have been identified at the non- school GSSD facilities including the administration office, the bus garages, and maintenance shops. Before investing in capital in any one facility the Board decided to conduct a facilities audit in order to identify the scope and magnitude of the capital projects. At the February 2018 Board meeting, the Board approved the award of the audit tender to PMGM Architecture. Upon completion of the audit, the Board will be presented with a report which outlines the deficiencies and opinions of probable cost for repairs. This information will be useful in guiding the Board in making long-term capital plans for all the non-school facilities. Funding for the study was approved from the restricted reserves.

STUDENT & FAMILY



PREVENTATIVE MAINTENANCE AND RENEWAL FUNDING PROGRAM

The Preventative Maintenance and Renewal (PMR) Funding Program is designed to assist school divisions with planned infrastructure maintenance and renewal costs. PMR funding is used for all facilities owned by the board of education to address the highest needs and top maintenance priorities in the school division. Hutterian schools and leased facilities are not eligible. Funding for the plan is announced annually in the Provincial Budget. The funds are restricted to be used only for approved plan projects. The funds can be allowed to accumulate and be used in future years as long as the projects fit the approved criteria.

The Board of Education is required to annually review and approve a three-year PMR plan. The three-year plan is to be submitted in advance of the following year's budget. This year, the plan is to be prepared for 2019-20, 2020-21 and 2021-22.

Examples of projects to be included in the plan are :

- Architectural roofs, building envelope, life safety, interior structure, accessibility
- Mechanical HVAC, plumbing, fire suppression
- Electrical lighting upgrades, specialty items such as power doors, primary and secondary electrical systems
- Site retaining walls, drainage
- Environmental asbestos
- Studies feasibility, accessibility, grade configuration

In the current Provincial Budget the Division received \$1,857,233 in PMR funding for the 2018-19 budget year. This is the most PMR funding Good Spirit has ever received. The current plan will be presented to the Board for approval at the May 17, 2018, Board meeting.

- By June 2020, GSSD will reduce the number of students reporting anxiety by 10%.
- By June 2020, GSSD will reduce the number of students reporting depression by 10%.
- By June 2020, at least 85% of GSSD students will be at grade level in reading.
- By June 2020, at least 80% of GSSD students will be at grade level in writing.
- By June 2020, at least 80% of GSSD students will be at grade level in math.
- By June 2020, at least 90% of students exiting Kindergarten in GSSD will be ready for learning.
- By June 2020, GSSD will achieve an 85% three-year graduation rate.
- By June 2020, GSSD will achieve a 90% five-year graduation rate.

NORQUAY HIGH SCHOOL STUDENTS PAINT CANVASES FOR HEALTH CENTRE RESIDENTS

In the spring of 2017, Norquay School was asked if their students would be interested in painting on the residents' doors in the long term area of the Norquay Health Centre. They decided that they would paint on canvas instead.

At the start of this school year, plans were made, and each high school art student was partnered with a senior resident. By October they were ready to meet one another to begin their project of painting a canvas that could be hung on the residents' door.

Before the project could begin, the students needed to get to know the residents. The students asked about their interests, hobbies, families, and lives of the residents before coming to the Health Centre. Some residents knew exactly what they wanted painted on their canvas while others did not. Art students took their ideas and created a rough drawing of the picture. These included flowers, farm scenes, animals, vehicles, and even mermaids. It was a very positive experience from the start.

Students have continued to meet with the seniors many times throughout the school year, visiting and having coffee with them. Both the seniors and the high school students appreciate the company and look forward to seeing one another. These students are giving back to their community and are making a difference.





INTRIGUING MINDS: PARENTS & CHILDREN TOGETHER

Intriguing Minds: Parents & Children Together (IMPACT) is a 3-5 year old school readiness program that Regional KidsFirst holds in as many communities as possible.

Parents and children circulate through ten different stations, in whichever order they choose, at their own pace. BUDGET FORECASTING

The Good Spirit School Division is committed to finding efficiencies each year that allow the school division to be responsive to the challenges of both student and staff needs. Throughout the school year, Administrative Council (Managers and Senior Leaders) undertake a process known as Budget Forecasting, which involves identifying budget lines that might potentially have surplus funds that could be reallocated to those areas demonstrating an emergent need. The process increases transparency among departments, demonstrating the philosophy that as a "collective team" we can assist one another to ensure that we are offering timely responses and supports to areas of need. The process ensures that budgeted dollars do not go unused but rather are re-directed within areas of priority. The overall process of "budget forecasting" has strengthened the Good Spirit School Division's ability to be good stewards of the resources it receives from the Ministry of Education.

Focusing in on ...

GOOD SPIRIT SCHOOL SCHOOL COMMUNITY COUNCILS

School community Councils (SCCs) are an integral part of every school. A school SCC serves as a primary link between home, community and school. The role of an SCC is to serve as a liaison between the school, community and parents. SCCs are made aware of the learning and well-being needs of students and work together with a school staff to ensure that student learning and well-being is attended to.

In cooperation with the Principal and School Staff, the local SCC assists in the development of the School Learning Improvement Plan (LIP). School Community Councils, frequently engage in discussion related to the progress, growth and action associated with the school LIP. SCCs are encouraged to advise on programming, extracurricular activities, student fees and fundraising opportunities. The local SCC has the responsibility of reporting to parents and the community regarding plans, initiatives and outcomes.

Research shows that students have a greater chance of being successful when parents are involved and engaged at the school level supporting their child's learning, thus the role of the local school community council is very important. Acknowledging it "takes a village to raise a child", Good Spirit is fortunate to have active and engaged SCCs within its' schools across the division.

On April 18th, SCC members, In-School Administrators, Trustees, and Senior Administration were invited to attend the SCC Symposium. The evening provided attendees the opportunity to engage in conversation on topics related to the SCC Health Check. Dr. James McNinch, who is the former Dean of Education at the University of Regina and who currently works with fYrefly Saskatchewan, and Kyla Christiansen, who is a consultant for the Prairie Valley School Division and also works in a consultative role within GSSD, provided an informative presentation on Gender and Sexual Diversity. Director Robertson and Deputy Director Kriger presented on topics including communications, credit requirements, special project credits, dual credits, apprenticeship credits, and budget.

Regional SCC symposiums will be scheduled in June for Senior Administration to meet with SCCs to unpack the 2018-19 budget decisions.
