SCHOOL DIVISION CONTINUES TO LOBBY FOR CAPITAL FUNDING

The Provincial Government provides all major capital funding to Saskatchewan school divisions. On an annual basis, the province produces a "top 10" listing of capital projects.



The Yorkton Regional High School (YRHS) has been on this provincial list for well over ten years. Unfortunately, the YRHS has yet to receive the major capital funding required to complete the much needed renovations to it's emergency systems, HVAC, etc. As a result, on March 22, local MLAs Warren Kaeding and Greg Ottenbreit were toured through the YRHS. Efforts were made to illustrate the urgency of this project for this vital piece of infrastructure.

Continued lobbying efforts will be made to arrange for an onsite meeting with the Minister of Education before the end of the 2018-19 school year.

CONSOLIDATION PROJECT UPDATE

The consolidation project continues to progress on-time and on budget. Significant progress has been made at the Good Spirit Education Complex (GSEC); the new offices and work spaces are beginning to take shape. The Board of Education has recently awarded the tender for the required electrical and HVAC projects that will be occurring during the spring.

GSSD has sold the Fairview Education Centre (FEC) to the Yorkton Tribal Council and the vacant Kamsack Bus Garage to the Cote First Nation. The proceeds of the sale of the properties will be used to fund the required renovations to the new complex.

The target date for move to GSEC will be late July to early August. Yorkton Tribal Council will take possession of FEC on August 30.

This was the first time the Northern Spirit Flutes were introduced to the grade 4 class. During my educational schooling, I had taken a class that introduced me to the Northern Spirit Flute, where I was able to design and keep my own flute as well. I was also given resources for teaching my future students about the Northern Spirit Flute which I was able to put to use during my internship. I was happy to pass these resources onto the grade 4 teachers here at Columbia School, as they now plan on teaching about the Northern Spirit Flute. CHILDREN'S LITERACY EXPOS: EAT PLAY LEARN

During the month of March, Regional KidsFirst in partnership with the Good Spirit School Division hosted a series of **Children's Literacy Expos** across the region. The Ministry of Education provided Regional KidsFirst with a \$25,000 grant to offer literacy and language opportunities for families with children under the age of six. The Eat Play Learn Children's Literacy Expos were planned and implemented in partnership with the following organizations:



- SK Health Authority,
- > Parkland Early Childhood Intervention,
- > Yorkton and Kamsack Family Resource Centres,
- > Triple P Parenting,
- > Christ The Teacher School Division,
- KidsFirst,
- Parkland Valley Sport Culture and Recreation, and
- Big Brothers Big Sisters.



Following the Regional KidsFirst mantra, 'It takes a village to raise a child', they brought the village together and connected families with young children to service providers in the community. Families rotated through interactive stations where they had the opportunity to learn about child development through play, and connect with resource people in the community. Children enjoyed learning about healthy practices, making their own nutritious snack, listening to Indigenous storytelling, engaging in puppetry, building structures with blocks, practicing self regulation, singing songs and rhymes, creating with recycled parts, and participating in physical literacy activities.

Eat, Play, Learn visited eight different communities and made stops in Canora, Preeceville, Melville, Churchbridge, Norquay, Kamsack, Cote and Keeseekoose. A total of 560 children and family members participated in the literacy events.

PROVINCIAL EDUCATION ENGAGEMENT SESSIONS

Saskatchewan school divisions were asked by the Ministry of Education to conduct Provincial Education Engagement sessions within their communities. Good Spirit held a session at the Yorkton Regional High School on Tuesday, April 16, 2019 and Melville Comprehensive School on Monday, April 29, 2019. Twenty-five people consisting of parents, School Community Council members, Staff, Trustees and Senior Administration had the opportunity to share their vision.

Director Robertson began each evening by explaining that the Deputy Premier and Education Minister asked stakeholders to begin planning for the future of education beyond 2020.

Attendees were asked to reflect on and then share their thoughts on the following four questions:

- What knowledge, skills and abilities do students need to be prepared for their future life and learning? Why are these important?
- > What gets in the way of student success and well-being?
- What is working well now in Saskatchewan's school system that prepares students for their future?
- > What needs to change in Saskatchewan's school system to better prepare students for their future?

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During the second activity, the group was asked to share their views on the following eight themes:

- > Graduation requirements are current and flexible, preparing students for their futures;
- > The education system is equitable and sustainable;
- > Early learning and literacy are foundational to future learning and success;
- > Indigenous languages, cultures and identities are affirmed and reconciliation is advanced through education;
- Inclusive and safe school environments support diversity;
- Strength-based approaches support mental health and well-being;
- > Curriculum, instruction and assessment are relevant, engaging and culturally affirming; and,
- Student, parents, teachers and communities are engaged in respectful relationships.

The information that was gathered on these two evenings will be compiled with the feedback that was collected from Administrators, Professional Service Providers and Central Office staff and submitted to the Ministry prior to May 10, 2019.

TREATY SYMBOLS PRESENTED TO BOARDS OF EDUCATION

GSSD Trustees joined Boards of Education from across the province for the Saskatchewan School Boards Association (SSBA) Spring Assembly in Saskatoon in April.

The SSBA Spring Assembly is an opportunity for Trustees to engage in professional development, with their counterparts from around the province.

This year, Boards were presented with Treaty Symbols from the Federation of Sovereign Indigenous Nations (FSIN). FSIN Second Vice-Chief, David Pratt, presented these symbols to Board Chairs, including GSSD Board Chair, Lois Smandych.

In 2018, the Federation of Sovereign Indigenous Nations, the Saskatchewan Indigenous Cultural Centre, the Office of the Treaty Commissioner and the SSBA signed a Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) on Reconciliation through Treaty Education.

The MOU represents commitment to working to address systemic discrimination in the spirit and intent of Treaty partnerships and as partners in reconciliation.

STUDENT AND FAMILY FOCUS

GSSD exists to provide the highest level of student learning & well-being. All students will experience learning environments rich in the opportunities and experiences necessary to promote intellectual, emotional and spiritual growth. Long-term Goals

- By June 30, 2020, at least 90% of students exiting Kindergarten in GSSD will be ready for learning in the primary grades.
- By June 30, 2020, at least 85% of GSSD students in grades 1 to 6 will be at or above grade level in reading.
- By June 30, 2020, at least 80% of GSSD students in grades 4, 7 & 9 will be at or above grade level in writing.
- By June 30, 2020, at least 80% of GSSD students in grades 2, 5 & 8 will be at or above grade level in math.
- By June 30, 2020, GSSD will reduce the number of students reporting high levels of anxiety by 5%.
- By June 30, 2020, GSSD will achieve an 85% three-year graduation rate.
- By June 30, 2020, GSSD will achieve an 90% five-year graduation rate.
- By June 30, 2020, GSSD students in grades 4 to 12 will report at least a 5% increase in student intellectual engagement.
- By June 30, 2020, all GSSD students will achieve at least a 5% increase in student attendance.
- By June 30, 2020 GSSD will promote empathy, respect and understanding in teaching related to residential schools and aboriginal history as outlined in the Truth and Reconciliation Calls to Action (Section 63).

MOCK TRIAL COMPETITION



After many months, and many organizational meetings and practices, Yorkton Regional's Mock Trial Club sent two teams of eight students (grades 9-12) to compete in Saskatoon's Court of Queen's Bench in the Provincial Mock Trial Competition, to reclaim the McKercher Cup, the highest award a school can attain in this type of competition in Saskatchewan. The event was held April 13, 2019, in conjunction with Canada's Law Day celebrations.

The field of competition was made up of a total of eight teams. Four of the teams were from GSSD.

Six Provincial and Queen's Bench Judges heard the fictional case of R. v Rogers, a manslaughter charge.

Students had to come prepared to represent the Accused on Defence, and also to represent the Crown.

Students were adjudicated for their speaking skills, planning, court demeanor, and argumentative skills.

Yorkton Regional's Team 1 was declared the winning team to receive the coveted McKercher Cup. Numerous other awards were handed out at the closing of the competition, such as best witness, best prosecutor, best defence, best closing statement, best opening statement, etc. Tasso Stamatinos and Kathryn Blommaert won awards for their performances as lawyers.

Students were coached by Ms. Tara Haugen and Ms. Susan Onda, with local lawyer Mr. Shane Wagner as their legal counsel.

ADVOCACY SESSION

On March 14, CUPE 4784 President Karla Sastaunik, DPEA President Dave Cheveldae and Representative Lariene Thompson participated in an Advocacy Session with the Board of Education to discuss those things that are working and what needs to be done differently.

Dave shared that cancelling bus routes either by text or phone is working well and requested that the cold weather policy is revised. The shortage of spare bus drivers is an on-going concern.

Karla suggested that support staff would feel a closer connection to the rest of the school team if they were mandated to attend staff meetings. Karla also shared that the relationship between the local associations and GSSD Board of Education is very unique - GSSD is the only Board across the province that takes the time to have open dialogue through advocacy sessions.

She is passionate in her beliefs that young children are competent and capable, and deserve many opportunities to explore, discover, create and learn through play in a dynamic and stimulating environment.

Christine's responsibilities as Early Learning Coach in GSSD include working with Kindergarten Teachers, Prekindergarten Teachers, and PreK

Educational Assistants to create environments that facilitate learning through play, to integrate language learning and literacy throughout the day, and to engage with families in meaningful and authentic ways. Administrators are supported in understanding what a high quality early childhood program entails. Christine also oversees the Regional Kids First Early Childhood Community Developer and collaborates with outside

agencies to support children from birth to age 5 and their families. Most recently, this resulted in eight Children's Literacy Expos being held throughout the school division.

Christine works with the Superintendent in charge of Early Learning to align policy and procedures related to early learning, to create action plans for curriculum, instruction and assessment that align with the Ministry of



Education's sector goals and the GSSD Board of Education's goals, and to plan and facilitate professional development opportunities for early childhood educators in the division.
