Prior to students and staff enjoying their well-deserved break, December was filled with numerous activities. I want to acknowledge the commitment and hard work of students involved with school sports teams, drama productions and music/band concerts. Thank you to the staff and volunteers for sharing your time, dedication, skill, and creativity so students may enjoy these experiences.

During the December Administrator meeting, the Technology Department announced that schools would be provided with replacement Chromebooks as part of GSSD's ongoing centralized replacement plan. Nearly 1,000 Chromebooks across the Division will be replaced at no cost to the affected schools. GSSD plans to continue this renewal cycle on an ongoing basis, ensuring that students have access to efficient and updated digital devices. I want to acknowledge the Board of Education for approving the Chromebook purchase.

Knowledge Keeper Linklater explained that the sweat lodge ceremony cleanses the body, mind, and soul. I thank Knowledge Keeper Linklater for sharing this important aspect of his culture.

During the December Board meeting, the Trustees and I were honoured to be joined by two of our Members of the Legislative Assembly (MLAs), Mr. Warren Kaeding and Mr. Greg Ottenbreit. During our time together, we had an opportunity to highlight a myriad of Division achievements and some current challenges. MLAs Kaeding and Ottenbreit committed to continuing the conversation to work collaboratively to meet our shared interest in student learning and well-being.

We all know that living on the prairies sometimes brings complex winter weather. I want to recognize GSSD bus drivers and transportation staff for ensuring students safely arrive to and from school. Thank you, as well, to the GSSD caretakers and facility staff for working diligently to clear snow and ice.

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
By June 30, 2023:

- the five-year graduation rate will increase by 2% from the June 2022 data.
- the five-year graduation rate for self-declared Indigenous students will increase by 5% from the June 2022 data.
- students in Grades 7 to 12 will report a 2% increase in student intellectual engagement from spring 2022 data.

GSSD PROFESSIONAL DEVELOPMENT OPPORTUNITIES

Professional development (PD) is an important part of high quality teaching and learning. As GSSD works towards the June 30, 2023 long term goal of committing to providing professional development and training days to staff, over 35 PD opportunities have been held so far. January 30th and 31st in 2023 will be dedicated to professional development for GSSD Staff.

The book club will continue for the remainder of the year.





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

PD Event	Date	Topic/Outcome
"Building Thinking Classrooms in Mathematics" Book Club	October 2022– June 2023	This book club is open to all teachers interested in learning about the practices outlined in Peter Liljedahl's book, "Building Thinking Classrooms in Mathematics: 14 Teaching Practices for Enhancing Learning." Participation is voluntary and meetings are held after school. Participants receive a copy of the book as well as one-on-one coaching support in their classrooms to implement the ideas presented in the book.
"4 Essential Studies" Book Club	October 2022- June 2023	This book club is open to Grades 7-12 ELA teachers who are interested in exploring the four practices for writing instruction outlined in Penny Kittle and Kelly Gallagher's book, "4 Essential Studies: Beliefs and Practices to Reclaim Student Agency." Kittle and Gallagher discuss new approaches to teaching the essay, book clubs, poetry, and digital composition. Participation is voluntary and meetings are held after school. Participants receive a copy of the book as well as one-on-one coaching support in their classrooms to implement one of the four approaches presented in the book.
New Teacher Onboarding	October 2022– December 2022	All teachers new to GSSD this fall were provided with a personalized half day of professional development as part of the new teacher onboarding process. Teachers were given the opportunity to complete a survey and were matched with a consultant or instructional coach according to their needs and teaching assignment.

HIGH QUALITY TEACHING AND LEARNING

NONVIOLENT CRISIS INTERVENTION TRAINING



Nonviolent Crisis Intervention[®] training is a two day course in which participants learned to recognize different stages that individuals move through as their behaviour starts to escalate and how to diffuse these behaviors while keeping everyone safe. This training, taught by GSSD Educational Psychologist Deb Bulitz and GSSD School Counsellors Doug Kreklewich and Craig Folk, is consistent with the GSSD administrative procedure which deals with the restraint and seclusion of students. On day 1 participants gained a basic understanding of crisis intervention methods. This training emphasized early intervention and nonphysical methods for preventing or managing disruptive behavior. On day 2 training expanded on crisis intervention methods. This training focused on the study and practice of non-harmful Nonviolent Physical Crisis Intervention methods, used only as a last resort when an individual becomes an immediate danger to self or others.

EARLY YEARS EVALUATION - TEACHER ASSESSMENT (EYE-TA)



The Early Years Evaluation-Teacher Assessment (EYE-TA) is a readiness-screening tool that provides information about each child's development and learning with a focus on early literacy skills. Results from the EYE-TA allow educators and school-based teams to quickly identify the students most likely to require extra support during the kindergarten year, based on their levels of skill development in five key domains at school entry.

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
EARLY YEARS EVALUATION -TEACHER ASSESSMENT (EYE-TA), continued...

The five development domains are defined as:

- Awareness of Self and Environment A child's understanding of the world and their ability to make connections with home and community experiences.
- Social Skills and Approaches to Learning a child's attentiveness during classroom activities and their ability to interact with peers while respecting classroom rules.
- Cognitive Skills a child's basic mathematics and pre-reading skills and their ability to solve problems. Could change to foundational literacy skills such as naming letters and knowing letter sounds relationships; numeracy skills such as counting and matching numerals with sets of numbers
- Language and Communication a child's understanding of spoken language and their ability to express thoughts and feelings; and,
- Physical development
 - Fine motor a child's ability to perform small movements that require hand-eye coordination.
 - · Gross motor a child's ability to perform large movements that involve arms, legs, and body.


In addition to results for specific domains, children are also assigned a comprehensive score known as a Responsive Tiered Instruction (RTI) level. RTI is a preventive approach that allows educators, school teams and divisions to allocate resources early and continuously, rather than waiting until a student experiences failure before providing a response.

The GSSD Early Learning Team meets with each school team (Kindergarten teacher, Student Support Teacher and Speech Language Pathologist) to review the EYE data and create a plan for whole class, small group, and individual instruction. These discussions are an essential part of responding to the data and creating plans of action.





HIGH QUALITY TEACHING AND LEARNING



In partnership with the Métis Nation of Saskatchewan, Good Spirit School Division is proud to announce that there will be a Michif Early Learning Program for children ages 3 and 4 in the 2023-24 school year. This program will focus on developing a stronger sense of identity through the exploration of Métis cultural knowledge and will introduce early learners to the Michif language.

The Michif Early Learning Program will infuse Michif language and Métis culture into the existing provincial curricula for Early Years Education. Through educating Métis children, it is possible to help in the revitalization of the Michif language and instill Métis cultural knowledge and understandings. Michif Early Learners will experience cultural teachings from a Métis perspective, learn in a play-based environment and have the opportunity to connect with and learn from Métis Knowledge Keepers and Michif language speakers.

On Tuesday, November 29, 2022, the Ivan Flett Memorial Dancers were welcomed to the Anne Portnuff Theatre to celebrate and bring awareness to Good Spirit School Division's new Michif Early Learning Program. The evening began with Quintin Robertson, Director of Education, welcoming those in attendance and introducing Minister Tim Roussin from the Métis Nation of Saskatchewan.

Minister Tim Roussin took to the stage to express his passion for reviving the Michif language and shared information about the work that has been done through the Métis Nation of Saskatchewan as well as what he hopes to see in the future for Métis children and families. The Michif Early Learning Program started with 150 students in the North, and now with the signing of GSSD, there will be a school in each of the 12 regions. GSSD is proud to be a part of the 17 schools and 600 students taking part in the Michif Early Learning Program across the province.

The program then continued with a lively performance by the Ivan Flett Memorial Dancers. The Red River Jig was a crowd favourite and left the audience on their feet with a standing ovation at the end of the performance. Mikey, the oldest brother of the three siblings of the Ivan Flett Memorial Dancers even invited young audience members on stage to learn the jig for themselves! Thank you to GSSD's Indigenous Student Success Consultant Jesse Armstrong for the organization of the event.





Sturgis Senior Boys qualified for Provincials by finishing second in their Region. They lost in the quarterfinals at Provincials.


Esterhazy Senior Boys qualified for Provincials by finishing second in their Region. They lost in the quarterfinals at Provincials.

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MEET A BUS DRIVER: CYNTHIA SWAIN

Meet Cynthia Swain.

First things first, let me start of by introducing myself. My name is Cynthia, and I was born and raised around the Stockholm Esterhazy area my whole life.

My husband Ryan and I, along with our two children, McKenna and Damryn live on the acreage I grew up on just outside of Stockholm.

We have 2 dogs (Hank and Harry) and 4 cats (Ollie, Otis, Owen, and Ozzy).

In the early spring of 2021, I decided to go for my bus license after a few fellow colleagues told me about the shortage of substitute drivers in our area. On May 17, 2021, I passed my licensing exam in which Good Spirt School Division helped me train and prepare for. The very next day the wheels were rolling on the big yellow bus as I had a temporary position until the end of the school year.



It was always my intention to be a substitute driver but when I was offered a full-time route for the fall of 2021 it was simply something I couldn't turn down as I had already fallen in love with my new career. Plus, my route consisted of picking up my own children from home and taking them to and from school. How cool is it that I landed the route my children are on!?

One of the most enjoyable aspects of my role as a bus driver is the interaction I have with the students. It is amazing the bonds and relationships I have developed with the students and their families in my short time driving.

A normal "typical" day for me starts at 6:00am as I carry out a thorough circle check of the bus, ensuring my bus is safe to be on the road each day.

I start collecting my first students at 7:20am and we generally arrive at school around 8:15 am (Our school starts at 8:30am). However, this time may vary as I may need to sometimes wait an extra minute for someone I expect to be on the bus. Some are always very punctual, and some are running to the bus, you get to know them very quickly.

I arrive at home around 8:30am and go about my day doing general housework, yard work, running errands etc. I may even sneak in the odd nap here and there.

My afternoon begins around 2:30 pm when I arrive at the school for after school pickup. Ensuring I have all the children on the bus we set off for their perspective destinations.

Some days we sing, others we chat about what they learned or did that day. Most days the bus is filled with chatter and laughter while in the very rare occasion the bus is silent with tired, sleepy children. My afternoons end around 5:00 pm when I arrive home.



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I love the thought that I am sometimes the first smiling adult these children see as I open the doors and greet them with a great big "Good Morning!" and I'm the last smiling face they see at the end of each school day. My bus children are like my very own children, and I always encourage good and

respectful behaviour on and off the bus.



I enjoy the interactions and friendships I have with my fellow colleagues, and the teaching staff. The teaching staff come and chat when the students are boarding the buses, they will give a wave as the drivers pull away in the afternoons. While I think they are waving goodbye to the drivers they of course may just be happy to see the children going home.

I find my job to be very rewarding in many different aspects as I've shared already. But I especially love that I have I have the same holiday schedule as my children and the whole summer off to be with them. You all must think I'm crazy, but it is the best being able to make incredible memories with my family doing what we love the most, camping!

Would I recommend being a bus driver to others? You bet I would. What more could a person want? School bus drivers have flexibility during their days, all school holidays off plus, a bonus of having the whole summer off!

Aside from that being with these children every day ensuring they arrive to and from school safely is the most rewarding part of all. Because I did that, I made it happen and I take great pride in that. As these children are OUR FUTURE!

BUS COLD WEATHER CANCELLATION INFORMATION

The decision is made to cancel buses in cold weather based on <u>Administrative Procedure 559</u>. Cancellations will occur in a certain area, or across the entire division, when the temperature is colder than -40°C or when the combination of temperature and wind chill reaches -45°C.

The factors that play into this can be:

1. Diesel Exhaust Fluid (DEF) is needed as part of the emissions system in the newer buses. Unfortunately, DEF freezes at -11°C. There is a heater in place for the DEF tank, but, when subjected to extreme cold, problems arise which include frozen/cracked DEF lines, leaks, and engine codes populating on the computer.

2. When a bus becomes inoperable, the interior temperature of the bus will drop very quickly. It can take a considerable amount of time to have another bus arrive to transport the stranded students and staff, especially when a bus is in a remote rural area.

3. In temperatures colder than -40°, frostbite can occur in minutes.

In the interest of student and staff safety, buses are cancelled according to the Administrative Procedure.

PAN-CANADIAN SUMMIT 2022

Through these highlights and learnings at the Pan-Canadian Summit, the committee will work together to create a plan that yields results.







directing and to all of the students and the orchestra that made the incredible musical possible. Everyone is so proud of all the hard work, dedication and talent that went into creating something so amazing!




