

By June 30, 2023:

- 25% more students will exit Kindergarten at appropriate development (green) than when entering Kindergarten.
- there will be 10% more Grade 1 to 3 students reading at or above grade level as compared to fall 2022 data.
- there will be 2% more Grade 4, 7, & 9 students writing at or above grade level compared to the June 2022 data.
- there will be 2% more Grade 2, 5, & 8 students at or above grade level in math compared to the June 2022 data.
- the number of students in Grades 4 to 12 reporting high levels of anxiety will reduce by 2% from spring 2022 data.
- the three-year graduation rate will increase by 2% from the June 2022 data.
- the three-year graduation rate for self-declared Indigenous students will increase by 5% from the June 2022 data.
- the five-year graduation rate will increase by 2% from the June 2022 data.
- the five-year graduation rate for self-declared Indigenous students will increase by 5% from the June 2022 data.
- students in Grades 7 to 12 will report a 2% increase in student intellectual engagement from spring 2022 data.

Professional development (PD) is an important part of high quality teaching and learning. As GSSD works towards the June 30, 2023, long term goal of committing to providing professional development and training days to staff, over 60 PD opportunities have been held so far.

MENTAL HEALTH FIRST AID TRAINING (MHFA) FOR ADULTS WHO INTERACT WITH YOUTH



On March 6 and 7, 2023, 22 GSSD staff including classroom teachers, administrators, educational assistants, and school counselors participated in the Mental Health First Aid (MHFA) for Adults Who Interact with Youth from The Mental Health Commission of Canada. Kyla Christiansen and Michelle Goulden facilitated the training that taught skills in understanding topic areas including mental health and mental health problems, substance related disorders, mood related disorders (depression and bi-polar disorder), feeding and eating disorders, anxiety and trauma related disorders, deliberate self-injury and psychotic disorders.

The aims of MHFA are:

- Preserve life where a person may be a danger to themselves or others
- Provide help to prevent the mental health problem from becoming more serious
- Promote the recovery of good mental health
- Provide comfort to a person experiencing a mental health problem

The key outcomes of MHFA training are:

- Increased awareness of signs and symptoms of the most common mental health problems
- Decreased stigma related to mental health
- Increased confidence interacting with individuals experiencing a mental health problem or crisis
- Increased help provided to individuals in crisis or experiencing a mental health problem

The evaluations from participants showed the training was valuable and increased the skills for the participants in their work with youth. GSSD has met its goal of having at least one staff trained at each school and will continue to provide this training yearly.



VIOLENT THREAT RISK ASSESSMENT (VTRA) LEVEL 2 TRAINING



On March 28 and 29, 2023, Bonnie Randall from Center for Trauma Informed Practices (CTIP) facilitated VTRA Level 2 training at the Good Spirit Education Complex. The training aimed to equip participants with the knowledge and skills necessary to identify, assess, and manage potential threats of violence in various settings. Through interactive discussions and practical exercises, participants learned about the importance of early intervention, threat assessment models, and effective communication strategies. The training provided valuable insights and tools for participants to enhance their ability to prevent and manage potentially violent situations, contributing to safer and more secure communities.

Good Spirit School Division was proud to open its doors and host community partners and groups for the training, providing a collaborative space for over 50 participants to complete their VTRA Level 2 Training. The two day session concluded with a resigning of the Yorkton and Area Community Threat Assessment and Support Protocol. had a toolkit of practical strategies to help them create a dynamic and effective learning space for their students.





The Senior Curling Team at the Yorkton Regional High School had a successful year as all three teams were able to qualify for Regionals. The Mixed team of Kaden Pihach, Elia Bolme, Gage Keller and Anthony Dubiel won a silver medal at ECDAA Districts which qualified them for Regionals in Lampman. They first played Regina Balfour where they played well, but lost 10-8. The team regrouped for their next game against Whitewood, but were unable to pull off the win, losing 8-5. Despite

the losses, this team played well and will be a strong contender next year with more experience under their belts.

YRHS Mixed Curling Team

The Girls team of Izzy Easton, Kyla Farquharson, Kali Neff and Jenna Laycock also won a silver medal at ECDAA Districts and then traveled to Regionals in Wawota for a chance to go to Provincials. The girls lost their first game 5-4 to Winston Knoll, but then came back with a convincing win of 12-3 over Oxbow. They then faced Esterhazy and were able to win 12-6 putting them into the B Semi-Final. The girls lost the B Semi-Final against Carnduff with a score of 6-2 which ended their run for provincials. This was a new team that gained some awesome experience that they

will carry forward to next year.

The boys team won the gold medal at ECDAA Districts this year. At Regionals,

also in Lampman, the boys Taylor Spokowski, Rylan Pihach, Kale Nabozniak and Carson Kerluke lost their first game to Weyburn 8-1, but then were able to win against Regina LeBoldus 4-2 which put them in the B Semi-final against Ogema. They were able to win over Ogema with a score of 9-3. The boys then faced Sturgis in the B Final and were able to come up with a 5-4 win and qualified for Provincials!

The YRHS Senior Boys Curling team travelled to Rosthern to compete in the SHSAA Provincial Curling Championship. This is the second consecutive trip to Provincials for graduating players Spokowski and Nabozniak who were looking to improve on their record

from last year. They lost to the home team of Rosthern in their first game, but quickly bounced back to win against Wynyard and Swift Current. This put them in a tiebreaker game for a playoff spot versus Rosthern. The team came up with a convincing tiebreaker win and clinched their spot in the playoffs. The semi-final was against a tough Saskatoon Holy Cross team who had dominated their pool. The boys played a good game against this team, but were unable to come up with the win. This put them into the Bronze Medal game where they faced Swift Current. This game was close throughout and in the end, Spokowski needed to make a takeout for the win. The team's hitting was their strength all weekend and Spokowski was able to make the shot for the Bronze medal win. Coaches Lana Stanek-Sebastian and Nathan Bewcyk were impressed by the boys level of play this season and their efforts to continue improving their gameplay in terms of skills and strategy. This is only the seventh time that a YRHS Boys team has won a medal at Provincials. The last time was in 2009 when Jayden Schwaga's team brought home the gold. This speaks to the high level of competition at these provincial events and to the skill of these players to bring home bronze.

Overall these three YRHS teams had a great season of competitive games and impressive gains in skills and strategy that will set them up well moving into next season.



Mr. Scott from Nawigizigweyas Education Centre spoke to the students about some of his family history on the Sturgeon Lake First Nation and the value his ancestors put on education. Mr. Scott shared his students' definitions of success and highlighted that the students at Nawigizigweyas Education Centre have similar definition of success as them.

Mr. Scott introduced a traditional hand game which many Indigenous People play. The students were divided into two groups and a member from one team had to guess which hands two members from the other team had hidden the smiley faced discs on. If successful, then the other team had to give up one of their sticks. If the team guessed

incorrectly then the other team got the chance to guess. Upon the conclusion of the game, Mr. Scott allowed the students to keep the game pieces in hopes that they will share the game with others.

Students also took part in a Blanket Exercise. The Blanket Exercise is an interactive educational lesson that teaches the history of colonization in Canada over the last 500 years.

Throughout their visit, the students were able to engage in traditional practices and gain valuable insights into the lives and traditions of the indigenous community.







SALTCOATS MUSTANGS CELEBRATE DIVERSITY AND INCLUSION

The Mustangs' month-long focus on inclusion during the month of February was a valuable learning experience for all involved. Through various activities and discussions, the students gained a deeper understanding of what inclusion truly means, and how it can be practiced in their daily lives.

This updated Protocol includes new additions and revisions that encompass Assessment of Risk to Others (ARTO) as a Trauma-Informed and Equity and Inclusion-Guided Practice.

The Yorkton and Area CTASP is a Multi-Disciplinary Partnership Committed to:

- Early intervention;
- Violence prevention;
- High-risk assessments;
- Interventions and supports; and
- Creating and maintaining internal processes and practices consistent to the model, in accordance with other CTASP partners.

The shared goal is safer schools and communities.

The CTASP demonstrates our commitment to creating safe learning and work environments in our community for individuals of all ages and abilities.

THE PRESCHOOL AND PARENT EDUCATION PROGRAM (PPEP)



The Preschool and Parent Education Program (PPEP) is a unique and innovative program that provides high quality learning experiences for children and their parents. It is based out of Esterhazy High School and has supported GSSD's mission of building strong foundations for bright futures for almost 30 years. PPEP supports parents to be their child's first and most important teacher, while also providing a holistic early childhood education for their children. The program is funded federally through the Community Action Plan for Children, and provincially through the Community Initiative Fund. It is the only CAPC project of its kind in Saskatchewan that includes both a parent and children's program.

PPEP provides a unique opportunity for families to learn and grow together, setting a solid foundation for future success. An integral part of the program is the supportive connections made among parents that last well beyond their years in PPEP. Parents are engaged in their

child's learning in the classroom and through various activities that give back to the community such as helping with Christmas food hampers, visits to care homes, clothing and book exchanges, and the Coats for Kids program. Memorable family events include potluck meals, family dances, cross country skiing, bowling, sleigh rides, and field trips to various businesses around the community. The parent program uses interactive discussions and presenters to engage parents and provide learning opportunities around safety, nutrition, mental and physical wellness, child development, positive parenting and discipline. While the parents are learning, their children are engaging in invitations to learning and play in a nurturing environment just down the hall.
