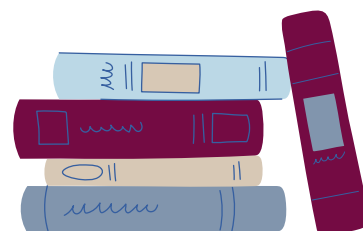
PD Event	Date	Topic/Outcome

This session focused on assessment practices in a Building Thinking Classroom's model and how we can use these strategies to effectively assess and report on student learning.

The day began with a flag raising and Victory Song, followed by teepee teachings and a hands-on teepee raising. Attendees had the opportunity to help set up the teepee while learning about the symbolism and meaning behind each part of its structure.

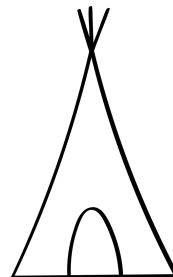
A special moment of the day was the unveiling of the Treaty 4 medal and plaque, now permanently displayed at the entrance of the Resource and Learning wing of the Good Spirit Education Complex. This plaque represents the knowledge, teachings, and shared reflections gained throughout the series.

Participants also took part in small group discussions, sharing what Treaty 4 meant to one another and how it continues to shape the understanding of home and community. The event concluded with a traditional lunch from Moose and Bannock.

Across all four gatherings, participants deepened their knowledge, strengthened relationships, and grew their connection to the land and to one another.

The project's final session took place on May 29, 2025. The Singing Stone Drum Group concluded their learning by making round drums from the hides they had worked with throughout the project. Robert Severight, GSSD Cultural Advocate, who led the drum-making session, provided teachings that extended beyond the craft itself. The school expressed appreciation for his guidance and the opportunity to work with him.

Through the Hides and Heartbeats project, Yorkdale Central School celebrated Indigenous culture and hands-on learning, leaving students with lasting memories and meaningful connections.

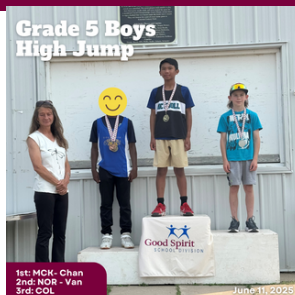

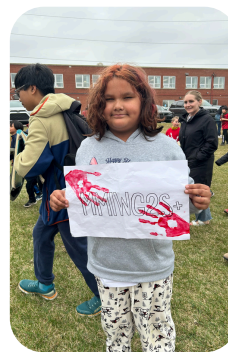

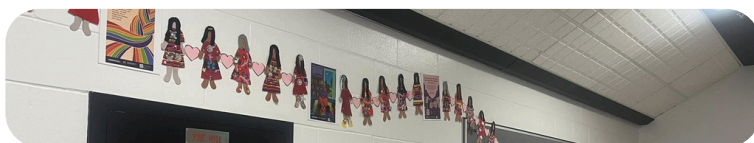
DR. BRASS SCHOOL HONORS MMIWG2S+ WITH DAY OF LEARNING AND ACTION

Students listened respectfully to speakers who shared powerful testimonies about the pain and loss their families have experienced.

Following the walk, the class shared a pizza lunch before continuing their learning in the afternoon with a school-based walk around their playground. Students carried homemade signs to mark the National Day of Awareness for MMIWG2S+, showing their support and understanding through their actions.



As part of their recognition efforts, the school also participated in the Faceless Doll Project. Each student and staff member created a faceless doll, symbolizing the lives of missing and murdered Indigenous women, girls, and two-spirited individuals. This meaningful project was led by Mrs. Fleury and Mrs. Taylor, and served as a powerful reminder of the importance of honouring those who are gone and raising awareness for change.

Congratulations to Christy Harrick for receiving the 2025 Inclusive Teacher of the Year Award, presented in partnership with Inclusion Canada!

Christy Harrick serves as the Student Support Teacher for Esterhazy High School in Good Spirit School Division. Her work goes far beyond job description. Christy doesn't just talk about inclusion - she lives it, she leads it, and she inspires others to do the same.

Christy can often be found co-teaching the classroom teachers throughout the school, ensuring each of them have the skills and support they need to be able to teach diverse learners within one classroom. She makes sure no student is left behind, and that every learner is met with dignity and care.

Christy runs a breakfast program entirely with community donations, ensuring no student starts their day hungry. She leads the canteen program with job-skills training for students with disabilities, tailored to their dreams and goals—like getting a popcorn machine just so one student could work towards their goal of getting a job at a movie theatre. She is also the driving force behind several inclusive extracurriculars, like the mentoring program with Big Brothers Big Sisters, and a new inclusive softball initiative in partnership with the Blue Jays Care Foundation. Her dedication to teaching has already earned national recognition - including the Queen's Jubilee Medal - but perhaps the most powerful legacy she's building is right in her school community: a place where inclusive education is not a set of strategies, but a whole environment. An environment where every student is given a chance to succeed. An environment where every teacher is supported. An environment where equity is not the goal, but the standard.
